From Father Duane's Desk

In 1976, the State of Michigan enacted the Elliott-Larson Civil Rights Act. In effect, the law prohibits discrimination based on a person's religion, race, color, national origin, age, sex, height, weight, and familial or marital status. There's a

group now called, Fair and Equal Michigan, who is circulating a state-wide petition to re-define what "sex" in Elliott-Larson means. That is, to expand its meaning beyond gender to "sexual orientation and gender identity or expression" and would reduce the definition of religion to the "religious beliefs of an individual" thus reducing the current understanding under the law.

The Catholic Church teaches that all persons are made in the image of likeness of God and are to be treated with dignity and respect regardless of their orientation or identity (ccc 2358). The Fair and Equal Michigan petition would go well beyond how we treat one another.

The Catholic bishops of Michigan have asked us not to sign the petition because the petition offers no protections for religious institutions, especially schools, charity agencies, and healthcare entities. It would impact athletic programs and community services. Also, to diminish the definition of religion would not allow us to exercise our deeply-held faith beliefs in the public square by providing no protections for faith-based actions or speech.

I share these thoughts from the bishops of Michigan and the Michigan Catholic Conference for your information along with the Q and A insert in the Pulse today, so that you can make an informed decision if someone should approach you with the petition.

Again, the bishops of Michigan urge you **not to sign** the petition.

On another matter, we will next week begin the CSA campaign for 2020. Although shortened this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the goal for our parish is important. Our AoD target is \$16,892, but we have set an internal goal of \$60,000 to take care of much needed maintenance on the parish complex. Please be as generous as you can. A sacrificial gift this year would be most appreciated. We need your help, and to help, get the word out. Remember, a pledge goes much farther than a one-time gift. I try not to ask for too much, but this year it is important. Thank you for your consideration.

23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

It's all about reconciliation and conversion, not punishment. Relationships are not static adventures but wonderful gifts that continue to develop, grow, change, and mature. We are meant to be social beings, so isolating

ourselves from others is rarely helpful. But, because human beings are on the one hand tremendously gifted, talented, and blessed creations, they are on the other also flawed, broken, and sinful. We all need to humbly admit that we are works in progress and not only capable of enriching each other's lives but causing deep hurts and wounds as well. Hence, we always need to be reconciled. We are always growing, changing, and expanding our knowledge of who we are and how we are meant to share life together.

Because reconciliation and conversion are always part of the mix of life, honesty is crucial. Without honesty, we can easily find ourselves living a lie and causing more harm than good. Being able to freely share our feelings, especially those involving pain and hurt, is a charism necessary to pursue and an art to learn. When we are wronged or wrong someone else, we do not enjoy the confrontation that can and needs to come. We are taught to keep our feelings to ourselves, especially when they are negative, and we tend to avoid difficult conversations. Hence, we never really learn how to confront another, successfully resolve conflict, find reconciliation, and welcome conversion. When we hurt or wrong someone, it does not mean that we are a bad or sinful person who deserves only punishment and excommunication. Quite the opposite! We are simply a human person who can make poor choices and sin and can be forgiven. We can restore and deepen the relationship that has been affected and find our way home again.

Jesus clearly wants to avoid shame because it has no purpose in achieving reconciliation and conversion. All broken relationships deserve a chance at reconciliation. Every person has room for growth and a need for conversion. We have to learn to be okay with honesty and not be afraid to hear and process what someone needs to say, even if it is difficult for us to hear. Severing a relationship, both personally or with the church community as a whole, ought to definitely be a last resort and only pursued when all else has failed.
