Feast of All Saints



I remember as a child the meticulousness my father would bring to a task. Whether it be tending to a chore in the yard, repairing something, or painting a room, the tiniest of every detail demanded his attention. He had great patience. I benefited greatly by his example and remember

these lessons well. We all need examples to follow. It is important to identity folks who excel at simple things and show us how to do things well. There are those among us and those who have gone before us who serve as these models and witnesses. They are ordinary people who in their "extraordinary ordinariness" capture our attention and allow us to see things more clearly.

These are the prophets, martyrs, teachers, witnesses, heralds, and innovators who bring a single- minded devotion to God to even the simplest of tasks they perform. They have an openness to being used and become vessels of Divine justice, mercy, and presence. They call us to the "more" of life and point us to the Gospel in all of its simplicity and splendor. They remind us of the little ones of the Kingdom and the values we all need to cultivate and possess. They are the poor in spirit, the meek, the merciful, and the peacemaker who often are rejected not only by those who have far different agendas but by those you think would welcome them.

All of the saints in heaven and on earth form this cloud of witnesses who journey with us as we make our way through life. They offer us inspiration, wisdom, intercession, and support. They direct us toward true happiness and remind us that we are all called to be saints. All it takes is desire, love, and fidelity. There is much we can learn from the official saints of the church. Their guidance is ever before us and ever with us. But there is also a lot to learn from the unofficial saints of the church. They sit beside us every Sunday, are our neighbors and ordinary people we meet every day. Because of the devotedness of their faith, they remind us to keep going, remain focused, and cultivate purpose and meaning, and give voice to those who have none. The inspiration is all around us.

Pay attention to the details. Do what you do with great love. Know that you are not alone. Believe that you can persevere. Have great faith.





Although many of the known saints have their own feast day during the year, on November 1, the Catholic Church remembers them all through the Solemnity of All Saints. For the saints that we do not have as much information about, or for those whose feats are still relatively unsung, the day offers an opportunity to commemorate their accomplishments and to pray to them, asking for their intercession.

According to Catholic doctrine, all the world's saints are forever spiritually connected with the world and can intercede on people's behalf because of a shared communion with Jesus Christ. The Catholic Catechism also believes us all to be connected with each other through this shared communion with Christ. A good many saints, from the thousands who have been officially canonized, have been instated as protectors over different aspects of life, such as St. Patrick for the Irish or St. Vitus who acts as the patron saint against oversleeping.

The first evidence of Christians celebrating the saints comes from the 2nd Century AD when churches celebrated local saints. Those honored varied by location. As time went on, feast days slowly became more universal, however, with evidence of a general feast day occurring for St Ephrem the Syrian (d. AD 373).

All Saints Day was formally established in 609 AD by Pope Boniface IV, although it was then held on May 13. The pontiff also created All Souls Day which is now held one day after the feast of all saints on November 2.

The date November 1 was eventually chosen in 835 AD by Pope Gregory III, but for some time the Church in Ireland celebrated on April 20 so as to avoid the pagan feast of Samhain, a traditional harvest festival and day associated with the dead from which many modern-day Halloween traditions were taken. Even in Ireland, however, the date was changed to November 1 when it was made a Holy Day of Obligation by Pope Gregory IV in the 9th century. In Eastern Churches, All Saints Day is marked on the first Sunday after Pentecost.

All Saints Day is the modern name attributed to the day, but it was once known in Old English as "All Hallow's Day" or "Hallowmas," making the previous day "All Hallows Eve" or Halloween as it is now more commonly known. "Hallows" is thought to have referred to the saints as they were the "hallowed ones."

CSA Minute ~ Sharing Christ



Jesus told his disciples, "Rise up, and be not afraid." Now it is our turn to answer the call, to rise up and be united in the mission of Christ. Please prayer-

fully consider making a one-time or recurring gift to help continue this mission and to help St. Matthew Parish bring the hope of Jesus and his message to this eastside neighborhood.

We have several urgent maintenance issues that need to be addressed, security fencing, removal of fallen trees, masonry work, and roof repairs. The cost of all that needs to be done was approved by the Parish Council; and, because the need is immediate, the Council approved taking the amount from our parish savings. This amount will need to be replaced, and part of that replacement will come from our CSA overage which is returned to the parish.

We have an AoD target of \$14,300, but the parish set an internal target of \$60,000, less than we actually received last year; but enough so that after our CSA target is met, we have an opportunity of gaining \$40,000 to apply to our operating costs.

Please again prayerfully consider giving to the Catholic Services Appeal. You will be supporting the archdiocesan programs in a big way, and you will be supporting your home parish of St. Matthew as well.
