

# 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"You cannot see the forest for the trees" is a widely known saying that can bring wisdom to our understanding of our journey. Often, our sight becomes limited to what is immediately before us. We lose touch with les-

sons and experiences from the past and promises and hope for the future. As human beings, we have the privilege of being able to choose things. What I like and don't like, want, and don't want can be major preoccupations of our minds and hearts. Our preferences and desires begin to define us more than the simple fact of our being. Who we are matters more than what we are or what we have. If we don't move beyond the external and superficial stuff to what really is of essence, we risk becoming very unsettled, disorientated, angry, and unhappy. We fail to see the bigger picture of hope and promise that lies ahead and the Divine Presence that has sustained and carried us before.

We like it when the "now" time of our lives satisfy us. Even the people who witnessed Jesus feed the five thousand got confused and distracted. It felt good when thousands of people were able to eat. They wanted to know what they could do to get this to happen again! But Jesus quickly reminds them that this is not the point of this sign. As much as the now time of our lives is of concern, it is not what is ultimately important. We need to learn the difference between being and doing, drawing more strength from who we are and who God is rather than what is happening around us and the choices we can make. Jesus is the true bread that came down from heaven. Jesus is the very incarnate presence of God who sustains life and assures us that we will not perish. This is not easy to understand and feel. We have to practice being in the presence of ourselves, others, creation, and God. We are brought to a holy place when we encounter the sacredness of being. This is real prayer.

Then, we learn to trust. It is when we cease trusting that we start to become afraid, uncertain, apprehensive, and doubtful, and overly self-concerned. We even start to grumble. God has our back. That is the essential powerful message of the living bread come down from heaven. God, who is alpha is also omega, the beginning and the end, and has everything in between in his care as well. A woman once remarked that her most powerful God moment happened when she and her husband cuddled with their new baby for a time. Without exchanging words and using only the affection communicated through sight and touch, they rested in being with each other. This brought them to the sacred, where they realized that a greater Being was with them. It was real. They knew that they were part of something bigger, intimate, and profound. When we rest in the Living Source of life, we will find that our souls are no longer hungry or thirsty.



#### The Revelation

The transfiguration of Jesus provides a glimpse of Jesus Christ's deity. This revelation of His glory is recorded in The Synoptic Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. One week before the Transfiguration, Peter shared his confession of Jesus as Messiah. Jesus would soon make His final departure from Galilee, about four months before His death. One of the purposes of the Transfiguration was to strengthen the faith of the disciples in the divine nature of Jesus before they experienced the shock of the difficult days ahead. Jesus longed for a presentation of His Heavenly Father's divine magnificence and splendor in human form.

While on earth, Jesus appeared in His state of humility and affliction. Glimpses of His glory were displayed while maintaining unity with His human form/appearance. As Jesus prayed, He was "transfigured." This means His facial appearance was changed. Jesus' face shown like the sun. The substance of His body remained the same; He was not turned into spirit. His body which had appeared in weakness and dishonor, now appeared in power and glory. His clothes became white and glistening as the light.

At Jesus' baptism, the voice of God provided the authentication from heaven, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." God repeats these words. All three Persons of the Godhead, Father, Son, and Spirit, were revealed.

#### The Conversation


Moses' and Elijah's conversation with Jesus focused on His coming death. Moses was the giver of the Old Testament law. Elijah was one of the most noteworthy prophets of the Old Testament. The Jews acceptance of the relationship between Jesus' death and the work of Moses and Elijah was crucial. Jesus' death abolished the bonds of Old Testament laws and teachings.

This divine conversation revealed Moses and Elijah not opposing cancellation of the written code, but freely discussing it with Jesus, showing that Jesus' work was not a contradiction or a violation of what they had done, but a fulfillment of it. In addition to a revelation of His glory, the Transformation verified Jesus' death was part of God's will, purposed, and understood long before it happened.

#### **The Transformation**

Transfiguration and transformation both come from the Greek verb *metamorphoo*, meaning "to change into another form." Scripture makes only four references of this verb, one as a reference to Jesus' radiant appearance at the Transfiguration, another as Paul travels on the road to Damascus where he encountered Jesus' light which left him temporarily blind and transformed him as a powerful instrument for God's glory. How are Jesus' transfiguration and our transformation interwoven?

The Transfiguration represents a focal point of God's Kingdom - Christ fulfilling the Old Testament prophesies - the cross, resurrection, and His eternal glory. All God's spiritual favors await those who place their trust in Jesus. Humanity was added to Christ's deity, yet He became the radiant "light of men." Jesus Christ, God's Word made flesh, offers magnificent illumination and transformation to everyone.

## St. John Vianney, the Cure of Ars Patron of Priests, Feast Day, August 4th

St. John Vianney performed many miracles. The greatest miracle of all was his life. He practiced mortification from his early youth, and his food and sleep were insufficient, humanly speaking, to sustain life. Yet he labored incessantly, with unfailing humility, gentleness, patience, and cheerfulness, until he was more than 73 years old. On October 3, 1874, he was proclaimed Venerable, and on August 4, 1925, he was canonized a saint by Pope Pius XI.


